Windham waterskier part of team setting Guinness World Record

It is not often that the little state of Maine gets recognized for something on an international level, but Brian Eastman of Windham and his team of barefoot waterskiers have changed that by setting the world record for the most barefoot waterskiers towed behind a single boat.

Brian Eastman was part of a barefoot waterskiing group that set a new world record of 42 barefoot waterskiers earlier this month. Eastman currently lives on Highland Lake and grew up in Windham. He has been waterskiing on Highland Lake for 50 years and has been a barefoot water-skier for 42 years.

Eastman is the youngest of five children and his older siblings were always involved in water sports and that helped foster Eastman's interest in waterskiing. He learned to waterski when he was 8, has been a barefoot water-skier since he was 16, and has been in and out of the water ever since. As a teenager, Eastman belonged to a local waterski club that staged water skiing shows locally.

His passion for the sport made him want to pursue a career in that field.

In 1985, he landed a job at SeaWorld in Orlando. Eastman currently works as a licensed master electrician.

"I think it was the excitement, the adrenaline, that made me want to start," says Eastman. "The difference between regular waterskiing and barefoot waterskiing is essentially the fact that you are going without skis, but you are instead going on your two bare feet. And in order to go on two feet without skis, you need to go

much faster. So, for example, if you are typically going 20 mph with waterskis, then you would be going 40 mph without skis. It is much faster, and you also need to have the correct body posture for it to work. Once you are going, you are on your bare feet skimming across the surface at a much higher speed that regular waterskiing."

Cyclist overcomes disability to complete gravel race

Gabby Sinotte was born without her left hand, so when she wanted to learn how to ride a bike like her older brother, her father taped a Styrofoam cup to her bike handlebars where she could place her wrist to steer. She's come a long way and this past August, Gabby Sinotte traveled from Windham to compete in her first gravel bike race in Steamboat Springs, Colorado, with her fiancée, Brian Duggan, and beat her own record time by 45 minutes.

Sinotte competed in the 57-mile SBT GRVL race, a world-class gravel cycling event held annually in Steamboat Springs, Colorado, and was determined to complete the race in four and a half hours, but to her own amazement, she finished in three hours and 45 minutes.

"So much faster than I was anticipating," said Sinotte. "I was crying before I think I even crossed the finish line because I was just like wow, I can't believe I did that."

She completed the race, not with a cup taped to her handlebars, but with her own prothesis that she has been developing over the past few years. Sinotte is a prosthetist which allows her to make personalized prosthesis for bike riding.

"It's been a progression over the course of three years," Sinotte said. "I started with what kind of looked

like a Lego hand that connects right onto the handlebar and it slowly built up my confidence riding. Now I have a kind of ball-and-socket joint that connects on my handlebar which allows me to stand and pedal which I've never done before. It gave me all the confidence to ride bikes at a higher level and I think once I got to that point, I was like ohh the next step is doing a bike race."

Sinotte started biking with her fiancée about five years ago following a situation that led to a silver lining. In 2019, when the couple was living in Northern California, they came home to find Duggan's bike and skis had been stolen from their garage. The money they were able to use from renter's insurance helped Sinotte purchase her own bike, and she has been riding with Duggan since.

"It was a horrible situation that turned really good," said Duggan.

Sinotte found a group online that was advertising to build a team of athletes for the SBT GRVL Race. Sinotte says she thought to herself, "this looks fun," so she signed up and didn't think much more about it until one day in November, to her surprise, she got an



email saying she had been selected on one of the teams.

Duggan also participated in the ace.

"It's an event that sells out and it's a lottery system. I was going either way, either being #1 fan or racing myself but yeah, I got to race," said Duggan cheerfully.

For the next 10 months, the couple prepared and trained harder than ever before. When they arrived, they were provided with lodging at an adaptive ranch that was made for people with disabilities and has adaptive facilities.

The race took place from Aug. 15 to Aug. 18. The couple traveled the course to familiarize themselves with what was ahead, but also to be able to stop and take in some of the scenery

along the route.

"The thing I love about bikes is it's a way to get outside and you can cover so much more ground than if you were walking but also go to way cooler places than if you were just in the car," says Sinotte.

Gabby said she can get frustrated when biking with Brian because he is "always way faster than me," but she reminds herself that he is built biologically differ-

ently than him, "and he has been cycling for 15 years. In the end, Duggan only beat Sinotte by two minutes.

"I'm blown away by how much she's been able to do on a bike in not very long," said Duggan. "She's blowing people out of the water."

Sinotte and Duggan train on their bikes year-round and say their favorite ride in Windham is Swett Road, a dirt road that the two always try to

go very fast on. Sinotte plans to continue training and has thoughts of possibly competing in the 2028 Paralympics. <



A Rock n' Roll friendship

I've made plenty of friends throughout my lifetime, some from school, some from my time in the U.S. Air Force, and some from work. But I find it hard to fathom that I met one of my best friends through a complaint.

A few years ago, I was the Executive Editor of a daily newspaper, and I was arriving back at work one morning when I heard a loud discussion taking place at the receptionist's front desk. A gentleman was asking to speak to someone in charge to file a complaint.

With many newspaper staffers not yet having arrived for their shift in the newsroom, it fell upon me to deal with the situation. I walked over to the receptionist and asked if I could be of some sort of help. She told me this man's name was Bruce and he wanted to know why Elvis Presley's name was not included in a photo caption published in the newspaper.

To calm the situation, I asked Bruce to follow me back to my desk and to talk with me to resolve the issue. He did and I was able to find out more about what he was complaining about.

Bruce had founded a nonprofit organization that staged dances featuring rock n' roll music and raised money for the Ronald McDonald House. Through ticket sales to the dances, donations from the community and other types of raffles and silent auctions, the organization had been able to raise thousands and was Ronald McDonald House's primary community

fundraiser for the entire state.

He told me that having an article in the newspaper was beneficial to promoting these dances but that in a recent article, a photo accompanying the article omitted an important name. He reached into his pocket and retrieved the article to show me what he was talking about.

I examined the article and looked closely at the photo caption. It described an event where members of the nonprofit organization presented a representative from Ronald McDonald House with a check for more than \$9,000 from a recent dance.

The photograph's caption listed the names of those who participated. But Bruce pointed out to me that the name of a person in the back row was not listed in the photo caption.

Several years prior to that, a committee member of the nonprofit had donated a cardboard cutout of Elvis Presley to display at the dances. It was used frequently for taking selfie photos with the display and according to Bruce had become synonymous with the nonprofit.

The cutout's continued popularity meant that organization volunteers would take it with them to events and fundraising activities. Bruce told me that several years before this most recently published article, our own newspaper had included the name of Elvis in the photo caption.

By this point in our discussion, I remained somewhat skeptical about including a cutout in the listing of names in the caption, so to put Bruce more at ease, I began to ask about how he came to found the organization.

While on a visit to Walmart, Bruce had noticed a young boy with his mother. The child was seriously ill, and Bruce asked the mother if there was anything he could do to help. She told him that the boy had cancer, and they were there to go shopping for items he could take with him to the hospital as he was going to be admitted for treatment.

I learned that Bruce was a former police officer and state game warden. He had served in the U.S. Army and was a huge fan of 1960s Motown music. He was semi-retired and had worked trapping and relocating nuisance animals in the area. He also would occasionally serve as a DJ for parties and school reunion gatherings nearby.

He had a heart of gold and after meeting the boy with cancer and his mother, Bruce took the bold step of staging a rock n' roll dance and donating all proceeds from the event to Ronald McDonald House which assists families of children undergoing treatment at local hospitals by offering them shelter and meals at no cost and at a most critical time.

Hearing his story, I couldn't help but be moved by it and I told Bruce that when a similar sort of photo including the Elvis cutout is used in future editions of the newspaper, we would include his name in the caption.

We shook hands and he left the newspaper office, and I thought my involvement with him was finished. That evening over dinner, I shared with my wife that I had met Bruce that day, and how I had resolved the issue.

She told me that going to the dances sounded like fun. We called Bruce and he was able to obtain tickets for us for the next dance. The organization has two dances every year and we haven't missed one since.

Bruce and I have become great friends. My wife Nancy and I serve on his committee of dance volunteers and believe it or not, we each have taken selfie photos with the cutout. And our journey to friendship started with a complaint about Elvis. < ~ Ed Pierce



Age Friendly Raymond promotes generational connections

This is part two of a series highlighting the return of Age Friendly Raymond. Last week's article introduced readers to the return of the program following its long hiatus. Today we will catch up on their innovative connections.

Even though Age Friendly Raymond has only been up and running for six months, that hasn't stopped volunteers from bridging the gap between seniors and youth in Raymond. What started as a small gesture of kindness has grown into something much bigger.

"In February and May, first graders at Raymond Elementary School colored 'Kindness' pictures for the residents at Jordan Bay Place," said Age Friendly Raymond coordinator Debby Tarr. The paintings were placed on individual doors and around the lobby and elevator areas."

The excitement was palpable, and before long, other RES students got involved.

"The fourth graders became pen pals for some residents and a couple other Raymond seniors for the last several months of school," said Tarr.

Susan Brackett is a fourth-grade teacher at Raymond Elementary School and explained how the events unfolded.

"My student teacher Morgan Burkholder started the project," Brackett said. "She needed to do a project involving the school and the community. Deb Tarr contacted the school about looking for a classroom to partner up with and when Morgan and I saw the email, we knew that it would be a great fit. Morgan introduced the program to the classroom and worked on the activities until her placement was over around the end of April. I picked up where she left off."

Brackett says that the pen pal project was a great enriching experience.

"The kids learned what it meant to have a pen pal. They each were matched with a senior. Some of the seniors wrote two to four letters each time so that every student got a letter," said Brackett. "The kids learned about what it was like growing up during the seniors' lives, what school was like for them, and a little bit about their family and likes and dislikes. The students also learned how to properly write a

letter back and forth to someone."

The pen pal experience ended up having some unexpected benefits as students got pretty attached to their "pal" as the school year progressed.

"As soon as the kids got their first letter, they were all really excited. Every single kid participated in the pen pal letters," said Brackett. "They were all sad at the end of last year, when I told them that this would be the last letter that they would receive."

Later in the school year, Age Friendly Raymond assisted a few residents with a visit to the school where the seniors had an opportunity to get to know some of their pen pals.

"This was enjoyed by both groups," Tarr said. "The fourth-grade teacher wants to continue this connection this coming school year."

Brackett said that the seniors and students played some games, and the kids were very excited to share some of their school projects, which was a really sweet moment.

"About one fourth of the class also attended Bingo at Jordan Bay Place," she said. "The students got to call out

numbers and serve the seniors drinks and snacks."

Current fifth grader Ben LeBel participated in the program last year and was excited to share his thoughts about the experience.

"I really enjoyed getting to know different people from our community," he said. "During Bingo they were actually kind of competitive. And of course I loved the treats we shared."



Student Amelia Wildes also recalls the event fondly.

"I loved bingo night, it was fun calling the numbers and visiting the older people", she said.

Aside from the community outreach with local schoolchildren, AFR remains active keeping seniors involved.

"Before Memorial Day, we assisted the American Legion in placing flags at veteran's graves. This is something we plan to continue in the future," said Tarr.

She explained that community service is just part of the support provided by AFR.

"I have transported some seniors to doctor appointments and have also picked up medical equipment at the medical loan closet," she said.

Tarr is excited about the popularity of the garden at Jordan Bay Place. She said that volunteers have logged over

100 hours getting things up and running there as well as lending a hand with residents in the garden.

"Avesta helped supply us with a few needed items to bring new life to this project. We have numerous residents involved in planting and harvesting flowers and vegetables," she said. "Extra vegetables go onto a table in the community room."

Residents can also sign up for a weekly technology help session hosted by University of Southern Maine senior and Raymond resident Elizabeth Petersen. She lends a hand with cell phones, computers, iPads, and TVs.

"Elizabeth has already donated 18 hours of her time to the residents, and they're so appreciative of her assistance," said Tarr.

Looking forward, Tarr said that more support is in the works.

"We are also organizing some presentations from SMAA on the increase of income allowed to receive help with more Medicare assistance, a talk with the Raymond Fire Department, and possibly a presentation by the Red Cross," said Tarr. "We are trying to widen these support services to other Raymond seniors, are able to find them."

Brackett says that she's thrilled to continue the senior-student pen pal project once again this year.

"The students and the seniors seemed to both really enjoy their time together and the letters back and forth. We have decided to partner up again with my new class and continue to grow on what we started last year," she said.

organization that has been trying to set world waterskiing records since 2015 located in the Wisconsin area, which was initially called "Chain of Records," and they set out to establish records of a large quantities of people doing different kinds of skiing behind a boat

This year, it is being promoted as the "Big Pull 2024."

"I came across their activities when they last did an event like this in 2021," says Eastman. "I reached out to them saying that if they were ever to do an event like this again, I would be very interested in joining. They reached out to me in April of this year saying that they would try to beat their previous record of 38 barefoot waterskiers."

At the event, there were 50 barefoot waterskiers chosen to participate from around the country in the lineup, and Eastman was one of those selected.

The event was held on Sept. 14 in Lake Dubay, Wisconsin and Eastman and his wife drove 20-plus hours one way just to get there.

"Last year, they were only able to have 38 people due to horsepower restrictions on the boat," says Eastman. "They had the biggest boat possible and at the time, that was the most that they could do. The difference this year is that they had a bigger boat and more horsepower, and consequently, the idea was that we could beat that previous record."

When the record was indeed broken, it was broken as a team, he said.

"It was not just the people on their bare feet who broke the record, it was the boat drivers, the safety personnel, and all the support staff," says Eastman.

There were waterskiers participating in the "Big Pull 2024" representing five different states, with Eastman being the one who lived the furthest from Wisconsin.

"I am very fortunate to have been chosen," says Eastman. "I was skiing with the best show skiers in the country, the best of the best."


There was quite an age gap between the barefoot skiers, with the youngest being 14 years old and the oldest being 65.

"It was quite a spectrum of all age groups, and it was very nice to see that," Eastman said. "I thought that when I went out there, I would be the oldest guy, but there were at least six other people who were older than myself."

The "Big Pull" event itself was originally created in 1999 by the Badgerland Water Ski Show Team and Aqua Skiers Water Ski Show Team. It was intended to bring together members of the two teams to attempt the largest waterski pyramid ever with at the time, the only triple rigged waterski boat in existence. Over the years, the event has evolved into a semi-annual event gathering talented members of various waterski teams from across the country to attempt larger and larger records in various waterski disciplines.

Since its inception, a total of 11 different Guinness World Records for waterskiing have been established, including the one Eastman was part of this month.

Water District starts project to locate service valves

The Portland Water District (PWD) has begun an extensive project to identify 40,000 "curb stop" service valve locations throughout its service area.

PWD has engaged Sebago Technics of South Portland to conduct the project. It will use high-accuracy GPS data points to locate and record the curb stop valves, many of which date back decades—or even longer.

structure. Currently, PWD has 20,000 curb stops accurately identified in its system; this project will update and confirm the locations of 40,000 more.


Although all the PWD curb stop locations were known and recorded at one point or another via "service cards," over time, changes can occur to obscure locations. Building sizes and locations can change, trees can be planted or removed, and streets and pavements can be widened or altered. Updating exactly where each curb stop is and how to reach it can be critically important.

"Precise GPS location of our service assets allows PWD to efficiently respond to leaks or water quality concerns by quickly locating and shutting

off water valves," said Chris Crovo, Director of Asset Management and Planning at PWD. "This improves our responsiveness, saves time, and reduces costs."

In contrast to information provided via service cards, GPS data points remain stable no matter what happens to the surrounding site conditions. This technology allows the valves to be located precisely and quickly, even under snow or underground.

For the first phase, Sebago Tech-



nics will focus on residential areas with one valve per property. As the project progresses, the work will get into more challenging locations, such as downtown Portland and the various islands served by PWD.

Customers may notice some of the work being done. Finding all the curb stops will require visual inspection, the use of magnetic wands, a limited amount of digging, and possible surveying. <



As we enjoy these final moments of summer and anticipate the beginning of autumn, I am reminded of how beautiful it is to watch the landscape change with the seasons. Here in Windham, we are fortunate to have so much surrounding natural splendor, chief among them Sebago Lake.

This lake – and all Maine lakes – are vital to our way of life, not only because they serve as crucial natural resources but because they are also a key symbol of our state's heritage. Recognizing their immense importance, the 131st Legislature prioritized enacting measures dedicated to upholding and protecting Maine's inland water ecosystems.

The Legislature understands that the ever-growing risk posed by invasive

aquatic plants to our state's inland waters requires continued effort. With this in mind, my colleagues and I passed a bill this year that will increase funding so the Department of Environmental Protection and the Department of Inland Fisheries and Wildlife can increase efforts to prevent and control the spread of invasive species.

Both departments play crucial roles in mitigating the devastating impact that invasive aquatic species can have on our water quality, ecosystems and even our property values. With this additional funding, these departments can better ensure that necessary resources are available to continuously and effectively combat these threats to our freshwater systems.

In an effort to continue protecting the wildlife that inhabits Maine's lakes,

my colleagues and I united to pass two pivotal pieces of bipartisan legislation. The first, co-sponsored by my fellow Lake Region legislators, Sen. Tim Nangle and Rep. Jess Fay, strengthens local control by empowering municipalities across the state with the necessary tools to more effectively enforce shoreland zoning laws designed to protect water quality and wildlife.

Previously, towns struggled to implement environmental measures, which often resulted in misunderstandings and lengthy lawsuits between towns and residents who violated zoning ordinances, such as cutting down protected trees. This measure enables towns to restrict, suspend or revoke locally issued permits that violate zoning laws, holding violators accountable and easing the financial strain on local taxpayers from potential legal battles.

The second measure addresses the unintended consequences of wakesurfing on inland wildlife. While this popular pastime brings joy to boaters and spectators, it has been shown to have a significant impact on the ecosystem and geography of our lakes. Wakesurf-

ing uses the full-throttle power of a motorboat to generate large waves, which crash against the shores, causing erosion and threatening the nests of common loons.

The new law prohibits operating a motorboat in less than 15 feet of water or within 300 feet of the shoreline while wakesurfing. It's crucial to balance responsibly enjoying this sport with preserving our lakes, and the Legislature carefully crafted this measure to protect our lakes' geography and wildlife while still allowing for summertime fun.

The measures above are only a sampling of the work we've done over the last two years to protect our state's inland waters, but they show our commitment and dedication to preserving the beauty and integrity of Maine's lakes. Through these efforts, iconic all-season retreats like Sebago Lake – and bodies of water throughout our beautiful state – will remain vibrant and healthy for generations to come.



Refilling operations starting for Dundee Pond

Repairs on a faulty gate have been completed and work is now under way to refill Dundee Pond in Windham.

On May 17, one of Dundee Dam's two deep sluice gates on the southern end of Dundee Pond used to pass large amounts of water during flooding events malfunctioned, and it remained stuck in the open position. It resulted in the pond having to be drained and repairs made to the gate.

Dundee Dam was originally built in 1913 and its operator, New Yorkbased Relevate Power, said that while the dam was at no risk of failure, the malfunctioning gate caused the water level in Dundee Pond to fall until it was completely empty. Dundee Dam is owned by Presumpscot Hydro, a licensee of the Dundee Hydroelectric Project, and operated by Relevate Power Management.

The pond and surrounding park are popular during for Windham residents to swim, enjoy a picnic or to attend free weekly concerts hosted by the Windham Parks and Recreation Department. Swimming was closed at the park throughout the summer.

Michael Shaughnessy, the President of the Friends of the Presumpscot River, said this summer that the low water level will have long ranging environmental implications for Windham and surrounding commu-

He said that the water there eventually reaches the Presumpscot River, and water and sediment drain through the gate and into the old rocky riverbed which is used as a trout spawning

"Any kind of spawning activity has been decimated by this," Shaughnessy. "Biologically it's set back for years," Shaughnessy said.

With the pond being drained, the area reverted to a sparse water flow called a "lost river" which was the site of an old canal project dating back to the late 1700s. During that time, many dams were constructed along the Presumpscot River for hydroelectricity. Dundee Pond itself was not flooded until 1910, meaning the pond drainage meant that the "Lost River" landscape featured a river was last seen more than 100 years ago until briefly again this past summer.

Matthew Wenger, Chief Executive Officer of Relevate Power, said that local contractors were hired to fix the malfunctioning gate and to conduct additional preventative maintenance on the dam, including completely overhauling the other mechanical gates to minimize the likelihood of other gate-related shutdowns in the coming years.


Now that all gate mechanical issues have been resolved, Relevate Power is slowly refilling Dundee Pond to its previous water level in coordination with the Maine Department of Environmental Protection and the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission, Wenger said.

All of the water refilling work is expected to be finalized no later than Oct. 1, Relevate officials say. <

Everybody is supportive; got really frustrated (in the third set) but picked it up in the fourth set. Our hitting went really well, we definitely got good at


being simple, because it takes simple over power, especially when it comes to winning, and getting the points. We could definitely work on our talking."

Too hot to handle

Space heaters and wood stoves great warming up chilly rooms, but they should be operated with a measure of caution. According ricia Zwirner, State Farm to a 2022 National

Fire Protection Association (NFPA) report that gathered data from 2016 to 2020, space heaters, whether portable or stationary, account for 33 percent of home heating fires. In addition, 88 percent of home heating fire civilian deaths involve space heaters. They also contribute to 80 percent of fire related injuries and 55 percent of home fire related property damage.

Wood stoves are a more efficient heat source than traditional fireplaces, and many units can keep more than one room warm. To help keep wood stoves operating safely, consider the following tips:

- Before buying a stove, check with your local fire department to get local ordinances on solid fuel burning
- Ensure that the unit has been tested and is listed with a nationally recognized testing laboratory such as

Underwriters Laboratories (UL).

- Follow the specific clearance requirements outlined by the Maine Office of State Fire Marshal. Maintain proper distances between the wood stove and combustible materials, per the manufacturer and local regula-
- If there are no manufacturer's instructions or a label on the unit, the NFPA suggests clearances should be 36 inches away from any combustible item, such as curtains or flooring.
- Regularly clean and inspect your chimney to reduce the risk of chimney fires. It's recommended to have a professional chimney sweep service to perform annual inspections and cleanings. Burn only seasoned hardwood or wood pellets in the stove, according to the manufacturer's directions.
- Wait until the ashes have cooled before removing them then transfer ashes in a covered metal container to an outside location 10 feet or more away from the home and douse them with water.

Radiant space heaters warm whatever is directly in front of them, while convection heaters can help make an entire room feel more comfortable. To use them safely, consider the fol-

• Choose electric space heaters that are certified by recognized testing laboratories, such as UL (Underwriters Laboratories) or CSA (Canadian Standards Association). Look for models with built-in safety features like tip-over protection & overheat shut-off switches

- Regularly inspect the electric space heater for any signs of damage or wear and KEEP THEM free of dust or debris that can accumulate and potentially cause overheating.
- Keep children and pets away from the heater to help avoid contact burns.
- Place the unit on a level surface at least three (3) feet from combustible materials such as bedding, curtains and furniture.
- Plug space heaters directly into wall outlets. Avoid using extension

cords or power strips, as they can overheat and pose fire hazards. Never use a space heater to dry clothing.

• Never leave an electric space heater unattended. Turn it off when leaving the room or going to sleep. Keep children and pets away from the heater to prevent accidental contact.

A kerosene space heater can warm a large area within your home. Some communities restrict their use so always check with the local authorities before purchasing or operating a unit. To operate safely, consider the following tips:

• Space heaters should be specifically designed for indoor use. They should be certified by a recognized testing laboratory, such as UL or CSA, and have safety features like an oxygen depletion sensor (ODS).

Vanessa and her husband Alex are coping with the loss of their son, Obe. Vanessa goes for a walk in the woods, where she encounters someone who takes a couple shots at her. She isn't hit and does not see the individual. When she gets back to the cabin that she and Alex share with his brother, Martel, she notices something strange after Martel burns his hand and she sees it in two different conditions.



She returns to the woods where she meets a version of Alex who explains that the woods carry fragmented

versions of a world in which Vanessa, Alex and Martel belong, called a multiverse. Vanessa is trying to find the space that might bring her son back. What follows is a very interesting, albeit confusing at times, hunt for different versions of the characters who Vanessa tries to decipher if they're from the space she is looking

When I first read the description for "Parallel" I was expecting a science fiction-based horror movie, and what I got was not that, but I was still on board throughout this time-warped adventure.

"Parallel" stars Danielle Deadwyler, Aldis Hodge and Edwin Hodge. Vanessa (Deadwyler) looks out the window moments before a bird then flies directly into it. She and her husband Alex (Aldis Hodge), along with Alex's brother Martel (Edwin Hodge) live in a cabin in the woods.

Alex and Vanessa lost their son one year ago. Alex fears he is losing his wife. After an argument, Vanessa goes for a walk in the forest where someone sees through their scope someone take a few shots at her but miss. Back at the cabin, Martel burns his hand on the grill; Vanessa goes to check on him. He says it's not as bad as they originally thought, and his hand is unbandaged. However, moments later Martel returns from outside and has a bandage on his hand.

Vanessa returns to the forest and finds a bloody handprint on a fence marked with "do not enter" signs. She enters anyway. Vanessa finds it hard to stay on the trail without getting turned around. She puts trail markers on the trees. Could there be someone else watching her?

After reentering the forest, she meets a different version of Alex from a different space in time. The spaces are fragmented versions of the world. The other version of Alex explains this multiverse with a detailed drawing.

They each learn about the other's past and try to figure out how to get back to their original space. It's here that things get strange. Vanessa returns to the cabin where she tries to explain the multiverse to Alex and Martel. I had a hard time figuring out which versions of Alex and Martel were interacting with which Vanessa. They tie her to a chair, because another version of Vanessa has appeared.

Alex wants to shoot a version of Vanessa, but Martel stops him. Vanessa returns to the forest, looking for Alex. After they argue about what the right thing to do is, he tells her to find a space and take it. Vanessa meets herself and there

As mentioned, I expected this to have more of a horror-theme to it, but what's scarier than meeting a version of yourself in the woods and not knowing if the people you interact with may see you as a threat? The plot moves quickly, and my only real complaint is it was hard to follow at times, trying to figure out which version is the "correct" version(s) that Vanessa is looking for. This is not an action-packed movie, but my attention was grabbed and held trying to figure out how this multi-versed forest works, to which I still have no definitive explanation.

- Only use propane space heaters in well-ventilated areas. These heaters produce carbon monoxide, so ensure that there is proper airflow to prevent the buildup of this toxic gas. Never use propane space heaters indoors without proper ventilation.
- Keep children and pets away from the heater to help avoid contact burns. Never leave it unattended, especially overnight or while sleeping. Turn off the heater when leaving the room or going to sleep. Monitor the heater and ensure that it is functioning properly.
- Use only the approved fuel clear 1-K grade kerosene, never gas-
- Do not refill a heater until the unit is cool and refill unit it outdoors.

• Follow the manufacturer's instructions for safely handling and storing propane fuel. Store propane cylinders outdoors in a well-ventilated area and away from ignition sourc-

Whether electric or wood, be sure to check that all smoke detectors are in working order with fresh batteries. It's also advisable to install carbon monoxide detectors near sleeping areas and ensure they are in working order. Follow the manufacturer's instructions on for installation and testing for both.


