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New K9 team enhances capabilities of Windham PD

A valuable new officer has joined the Windham Police Department and it's a responsibility he can really sink his teeth into.

K9 Zeus is a 16-month-old Belgian Malinois who is partnered with his handler, Officer Sam Pattee, a four-year veteran of the department. They are currently involved in training for Zeus to become a fully certified patrol dog, meaning he'll be certified in tracking, article searches, apprehension work and narcotics certification.

"I grew an interest in being a K9 handler almost as soon as I got started on the road with Windham PD," Pattee said. "I assisted K9 handlers from Westbrook PD, the Cumberland County Sheriff's Office and Portland PD on tracks in Windham for everything from locating elderly citizens who had wondered away to Domestic Violence suspects who had fled from the scene. I quickly realized that Windham needed to have a K9 asset and wanted to be the one to provide it. I was also excited by the idea

of assisting officers on a variety of calls and improving the department's capabilities."

Pattee said that K9 Zeus came from Boston Police Department's training barracks and was selected by him with the help of K9 trainers from both the Cumberland County Sheriff's Office and Scarbrough PD.

"I was looking for a dual purpose K9, meaning a K9 fully capable of patrol work and narcotics detection," he said. "I viewed multiple possible K9s but when I met Zeus, I quickly knew he was the one. He was full of energy, fearless and I felt a bond with him from the start."

Becoming a K9 handler was almost second nature for Pattee.

"Growing up, my family always had dogs. There's an obvious difference between them and K9 Zeus, those three were pets and farm dogs while K9 Zeus is a working dog, he said. "K9 Zeus is full of more energy than any one person could ever use in a day, but he is also incredibly smart and capable of solving his own prob-

Abbreviated ice fishing derby remains fun for anglers

Sebago Lake wasn't completely frozen over but there was a great deal of excitement surrounding this year's 24th Annual Ice Fishing Derby hosted by the Sebago Lake Rotary Club on Saturday, Feb. 15

Recent cold temperatures allowed portions of the lake to ice over for the first time in several years and although Sebago's Big Bay was not considered completely safe, the Lower Bay and Jordan Bay were favorable for fisherman to enjoy a great day on the ice, said Cyndy Bell of the Sebago Lake Rotary Club.

Bell said you could hear excitement in the fishermen's voices as they came to register or to weigh their fish that they were happy to be back out on Sebago Lake this year.

"It appeared that the fish just weren't biting like they had in past years so fewer fish were brought to the weigh stations on Saturday," Bell said. "The event had to cancel Sunday in anticipation of the incoming storm."

The ice fishing contest proved once again to be more than just an excuse to get outside for time spent fishing. Proceeds from the Ice Fishing Derby benefit local charities and nonprofit organizations that the Rotary Club donates to, including "Feed the Need," which assists with funding for 12 food pantries in the Lakes Region of Maine.

Anglers found that searching for

suitable ice was fun and the event brought together people from all walks of life, helping forge new friendships among those fishing and left them with great stories to tell about their experiences that probably will be shared for a lifetime.

Participants also fished in the 20-plus remaining lakes and ponds in the weighing area that had adequate ice to ensure safety and found an abundance of perch and pickerel ready to be caught.

Bell said that as in years past, participating fishermen continued to donate their catches which were delivered to Nova Seafood and will be processed and delivered to assist in feeding the homeless and those facing food insecurity.

Tom Noonan, a Sebago Lake Rotary Club member, is credited with coming up with the concept for the Ice Fishing Derby in 2001 in cooperation with the Maine Inland Fisheries and Wildlife Department.

Since then, the event has grown substantially to become the Sebago Lake Rotary Club's largest annual fundraising initiative and has supported hundreds of charities over the past two decades, with more than \$1 million donated to local causes since its inception.

"Under the leadership of Sebago Lake Rotarian Toby Pennels, the derby gained additional national notoriety as one of only four fishing derbies in the United States to be featured in a television program filmed for the National Geographic Channel that aired in June 2014," Bell said.

A life to be remembered

For years when I was downcast and dejected, I knew that a phone call with one of my closest friends would lift my spirits. Todd Clemens had an innate way of knowing exactly what to say to make me feel better or to support my decisions when I even had my doubts about some of them.

I first met Todd the summer before my sophomore year of high school when we each coached Little League teams on the ballfields behind Winslow Elementary School and Carlton Webster Junior High in Henrietta, New York. He had given me some coaching tips to instruct baserunning and congratulated me when my team's pitcher threw a no-hitter leading us to a 1-0 win in the opening playoff game.

In high school that year, I had Todd's father, George, as my Physical Education teacher and Todd was in some of the same classes as me. He always was kind and supportive to everyone he met and was a natural athlete, playing football, basketball and baseball for our school.

After high school, Todd attended West Point Military Academy but transferred to Colgate University where he earned his degree. He married and had children and was thrilled to be working as a broker on Wall Street in New York City.

But his perfect life suddenly fell apart when he came home from work to find an empty house. His wife had left him for

his boss and took the kids with her out of state. He began a frantic search to find them and when he did locate them, he discovered that his wife was suing him for divorce and custody of their children. And he learned that his wife had maxed out their credit cards, leaving him deeply in debt.

He quit his Wall Street job and took a job coaching football and baseball and teaching French at Chaminade High School in South Florida, but a prolonged divorce and custody lawsuit left him depressed and a shell of his former self.

For a while, he took a job for several years as a sportswriter at a newspaper in Connecticut but ended up having to commute back and forth from Massachusetts because the Connecticut state taxes were so high, it left him unable to even rent his own apartment.

Eventually he paid off the enormous credit card debt and moved to Arizona, where he worked as a broker and financial services advisor in Phoenix. He told me that he was proud that his son pitched for Boston College in a spring exhibition game against the Boston Red Sox. And in working as a sportswriter, he was following in his mother's footsteps as she was the first female sportswriter in the state of Indiana.

Listening to his story, I tried to cheer him up as much as I could during our lengthy phone conversations, but he ended up encouraging me as I was working for a newspaper in Florida and starting to put my own life back together after my first wife's death at the age of 37. We talked a lot about baseball, and Todd took great delight in sharing how his favorite team, the 1971 Pittsburgh Pirates, had defeated my beloved Baltimore Orioles in the World Series, 4 games to 3, by winning the final game of the 1971 World Series, 2-1, in Baltimore.

As his parents aged and needed help, Todd moved back to Massachusetts from Arizona. His mother died in 2011, and he then stayed with his father to look after him. In 2014, Todd called to tell me he had read an article in the Boston Globe I had written for the newspaper I was working for in New Hampshire. It was picked up and run nationally by the Associated Press and he wanted me to know what a


One summer evening in 2017, Todd decided to jog a couple laps around the high school track in Milford, Mass. after dinner to stay in shape. He passed out on his second lap and when he woke up, he was in a hospital bed, and one of his legs had been amputated just below the knee. He fought valiantly to overcome infection and the lingering trauma of losing a leg and finding a comfortable prosthetic.

When my mother died in August 2018, I was surprised to receive a call from Todd. Despite everything he was going through himself, he took the time to call and let me know how sorry he was and how proud he was of my career. It certainly meant a lot to me. In February 2019, Todd's father died. I called Todd and he thanked me for being supportive. He said he was slowly putting his life back together and was very appreciative of me mailing him some old Pittsburgh Pirates

baseball cards.

On July 26, 2019, I received word from a classmate that my friend Todd had died at the age of 65. He was someone of high character, intelligent, athletic, kind, warm and personable.

At each class reunion I attend, it pains me to see his photo included on the poster of lost classmates. The world sure lost a good person. < ~ Ed Pierce



Federal funding to clean up Keddy Mill may be slashed

With drastic budget reductions planned for many federal agencies, the status of available funding to complete the Environmental Protection Agency's cleanup of the contaminated Keddy Mill in South Windham is up in the air

The Keddy Mill site is located at 7 Depot St. in South Windham and includes a 6.93-acre abandoned mill complex property adjacent to the Presumpscot River. The mill building was constructed in the early 1900s although a sawmill existed there previously.

The sawmill closed in 1822, and the Keddy Mill property was then used as a grist and carding mill. In 1875, the Sebago Wood Board Company acquired the mill site and constructed a pulp mill complex, which included a three-story main mill building, machine room, drying rooms, and a wood preparing house. Between the late 1800s and 1922 additional process buildings/facilities were added, including storehouses, a second railroad siding, the finishing and shipping building, a water tank, machine room, and engine room. The mill was used for pulp and box-board manufacturing through the 1940s.

In 1945, the Keddy Mill shifted from manufacturing paper to steel products such as heavy equipment buckets. Scrap metal was transported by rail cars to the mill and melted into steel billets, which were then used to manufacture steel parts. By the 1960s and early 1970s, manufacturing included flanges and fire suppression materials. EPA officials say that

it was during this period that significant disposal of hazardous substances, including harmful PCBs, may have occurred at the site. A large oil-based fire in 1969 damaged the mill complex and destroyed several blast furnaces and by 1974, a scrap recycler launched operations in the mill building.

The property was used as a machine shop and for equipment storage until 1997.

Since 2014, the Keddy Mill site has been included on the EPA's National Priority List, also known as the Superfund, recognizing it as contaminated and hazardous to human health.

In 2023, after years of conducting environmental studies, the EPA Superfund adopted a cleanup and remediation plan based upon an EPA Remedial Investigation Report, human health and ecological risk assessments, the Feasibility Study, and comments received on EPA's Proposed Plan during a 30-day public comment period

"EPA's cleanup plan for the Keddy Mill Superfund Site is a strong effort

to ensure the health and safety of community members, protecting them for generations to come," said EPA New England Regional Administrator David W. Cash at the time. "Cleaning up Superfund sites helps us ensure that no community, no family, and no child has to face exposure to chemicals and other dangerous substances in their day-to-day lives."

Consistent with Superfund agreements signed in 2022, the EPA has been developing plans for the implementation of various investigations which are necessary in advance of the mill's demolition. Data collection was completed in 2024 and the submittal of a PDI Report is anticipated by early April 2025. The results of these investigations will be evaluated and ultimately used to support the design of the demolition and removal activities.

Following approval of the design,

the removal action will be implemented by the PRP and then EPA Superfund monies obtained for the work. That is, if adequate funding is made available.

EPA's cleanup plan will take two to four years to design and execute and will take place after the significant completion of a Removal Action to demolish the mill complex and associated structures.

The cleanup plan includes the following components:

- * Excavation and off-site disposal of contaminated soil and debris from the Mill Complex property
- * Targeted treatment of soil (within the footprint of the excavation) with amendments in support of groundwater cleanup
- * In place treatment of groundwater contaminants
- * Excavation and off-site disposal of contaminated sediments from the Presumpscot River
- * Treatment of water generated from soil and sediment dewatering and removed from excavations based on applicable water discharge standards, as required
- * Restoration of the portions of the Presumpscot River altered by the re-

Local author to discuss her popular book at Erik's Church

The enduring popularity of a Raymond author's book remains strong. Cheryl Blanchard will be discussing both her book and additional memories about her childhood at an upcoming event at Erik's Church in Windham.

Blachard is the author of "236 Cumberland Ave. Portland, Maine: Strange Happenings in our Young Lives," and she will be speaking at the meeting of Volunteers of America group at 2 p.m. Thursday, Feb. 27 and everyone is welcome to attend.

The book is a recounting of tales from Blanchard and her siblings' recollections that haven't been spoken of for more than half a century. Published by Newman Springs Publishing, the book remains popular more than

five years after it was first published, and especially among Maine residents.

"It's amazing how my story about my childhood and my gifted talents and all the music has touched so many and how it all saved our young souls through this time in our lives," Blanchard said. "Volunteers of America had so much involvement with this. I've been so honored to have this invitation to meet with their team and to share more memories."

In the book, Blanchard describes how she and her siblings would suddenly catch glimpses of silhouettes and shadowy figures looming on walls in their home without a human nearby casting a silhouette or shadow. She also discusses in detail finding a tunnel underneath the building she lived in, and many frightful memories associated with that.

"There are such a lot of memories

for a small child at the age of 6, along with five brothers and five sisters who were also very young," Blanchard said. "All of those memories are still living in the minds of all of us. We haven't talked about them in over 50 years. I would like to thank the Maine historian Herb Adams for asking me about the house up over Botto's Market that I lived in as a child."

Blanchard's family eventually moved away from the building and the trauma and bad memories she and her siblings experienced living there. The entire block has been demolished since the family moved from there in the early 1970s.

Just a few years ago, one of her friends asked Blanchard to share some of her memories about growing

up there and that led to the creation of "236 Cumberland Ave. Portland, Maine: Strange Happenings in our Young Lives."

Once her book was published, Blanchard was then interviewed on the Maine television show "207" and she also received a personal note from renowned Maine resident and noted author Stephen King, who is a master of telling "haunted" stories. In

2019, she was a guest of book groups that met at public libraries in Augusta and in Windham to discuss her book.

Despite being subjected to what she calls "paranormal occurrences" while growing up on Cumberland Avenue in Portland decades ago, Blanchard has gone on to lead a happy, and pro-

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Windham committee aims to improve area water quality

The Natural Resource Advisory Committee of Windham is working to improve protections on bodies of water that have been identified as polluted in the Windham, Grey and Falmouth areas, with a focus on lakes and streams.

Dennis Brown participates in Falmouth Conservation Committee activities and serves as the chair of the Natural Resources Advisory Committee in Windham.

"Our job is to make sure that the streams and lakes and ponds in Windham are protected from further degradation and in fact improved," says Brown.

Most of Brown's work has been on improving the environmental protections on Highland Lake, which he says is considered one of the most protected lakes in the state. Seeing these improvements, the committee was able to get many of the same protections to apply to the other lakes in town.

Brown started working with the town of Gray two years ago to get them to instill similar protection to the ones in Windham. They had a meeting on the morning of Feb. 10 to discuss these protections and how they will focus these protections on lakes and streams.

Windham has five streams that are impaired and most of the lakes and ponds are on the Department of Environmental Protection list of most at risk of new development.

Brown says the committee's solution is to keep its focus on increasing water protections, with some additional emphasis on the Pleasant River watershed and on Blackbrook Preserve.

While the lakes are monitored by local lake associations, it's hard to get people invested in the streams.

"It's hard to get the same enthusiasm as you get for a lake," said Brown.

Recent focus of the NRAC has been on the Pleasant River, where there is already an established watershed program. However, watershed programs come in 10-year spans and it's reaching the end of its term.

Recognizing that a large part of the river in located in Gray, Brown says the committee is working with the Presumpscot Regional Land Trust to focus water testing that's done on many of the streams in the Windham, Portland, Westbrook area on the Pleasant River. It originates in the town of Gray and follows U.S. Route 202 as it flows through the town of Windham to discharge into the Presumpscot River upstream in South Windham.

It was discovered that the land trust has water testing sites for the Pleasant River, but they are all located in Windham. Brown was able to identify a spot on the Windham and Falmouth town line to find out if the water enters Windham in bad shape, or if Windham is causing the pollution. What was found is that the water coming in from Gray was already impaired. Brown is now working with the town of Gray to upgrade their water protection ordinates in the town.

"Sustainably encompasses environmental, economic, and social concerns, which are not mutually exclusive," says Mary Wicklund, Environmental and Sustainability Coordinator in Windham. "No matter which perspective you choose, sustainability initiatives for the town are driven by the desire to create a more resilient future for our community."

Wicklund started as the Environmental and Sustainability Coordinator for the Town of Windham in mid-September. The position of Environmental and Sustainability Coordinator is a specialized professional and technical position with responsibility for developing comprehensive policy and a strategic plan that encompasses current and long-term environmental initiatives towards a more environmentally

sustainable future – including planning, managing, and coordinating the activities and implementation of the Stormwater Management Program.

This position has three priorities:

- MS4/Stormwater Implement Windham's MS4 General Permit with including annual inspections of stormwater infrastructure, conducting illicit discharge detection and elimination follow-up, providing technical training to municipal staff and board/committee members, and developing outreach for the community on issues relating to stormwater. Windham is a member of the Interlocal Stormwater Working Group (ISWG), a coalition of 14 municipalities and two nested communities in the greater Portland and Saco areas, who work together to address stormwater pollutants.

lems without needing much of anything from me. K9 Zeus loves tracking and can go all day, being just as excited about it when he's finished, as he was when he started."

According to Pattee, K9 training is not an easy task.

"It takes a lot of time, dedication and patience. It takes a level of commitment that you can't truly understand until you've done it yourself. I train with the group called Law Enforcement Dogs of Maine (LEDME) and it requires at least 480 hours of training with a certified trainer before a K9 team can be certified in patrol work," he said. "In training we work on tracking, article searching, which is locating items that someone may have dropped or thrown, and suspect

apprehension. We also conduct scenario-based training which puts both the K9 and the handler through real world situations and helps us be better prepared to make the right decisions on real deployments. The group has a great team of trainers with years of combined K9 experience to learn from and I appreciate everything they've taught me."

The Windham Police Department last had a K9 team about four years ago, but since then has had assistance from other agencies when a K9 is needed or would be helpful.

"Time can play a big factor during certain calls and an available team may be too far away to be effective," Pattee said. "With Windham gaining a K9 team again, we can improve are response times to situations as having the resource a K9 brings. For exam-

ple, if an elderly citizen with dementia has wondered away from home and gotten lost in the woods, Windham now has a K9 nearby to pick up that person's trail and locate them much quicker than waiting for a team from an outside agency."

Pattee spent his early childhood in Westbrook and then moved to Windham, where he graduated from Windham High School. While still in high school, he joined the U.S. Army Reserves and he continues to serve in the reserves, where he's been enlisted for 11 years with one mobilization overseas

He says his girlfriend has been a huge supporter of his efforts to become a K9 handler, which is not easy.

"Being a K9 handler is what you make of it," Pattee said. "It takes a lot of dedication, and you have to love what you're doing to make the most of it. You have to be ready to continuously learn and improve your skills as

well as being able to understand what your K9 partner is trying to tell you."

The greatest misconception the public may have about K-9 police dogs is that although patrol certified K9 teams have the ability to apprehend a suspect with force, that is not the primary goal of a K9.

"K9s are a locating tool. This could be locating a suspect who has fled a scene or vehicle, to find a missing person, or helping officers identify where a suspect is hiding inside a building which improves safety for all involved," Pattee said. "K9 Zeus is a very happy dog and full of excitement every day. He's not just a tool but also my partner. We are both very excited for the opportunity to serve the Windham community and its citizens. When you see us around town, K9 Zeus may be barking but know he is there ready to help serve and protect the same as every officer from the Windham Police Department is." <

sponsibility for coordinating watershed monitoring and protection efforts across the municipality. The town is partnering with Cumberland County Soil and Water Conservation District to identify, prioritize, and strategize ways to effectively protect and improve threatened or impaired waters. Efforts include working with the CCSWCD during efforts to implement and update the Pleasant River Watershed Management Plan and supporting the Presumpscot Regional Land Trust on volunteer water quality monitoring. With support from the Natural Area Resources Committee, the town offers Watershed Protection Grants

to support watershed protection/improvement efforts.

• Sustainability - Coordinate Town strategic plan and policies that encompass current and long-term initiatives toward a more environmentally and economically sustainable future.

According to Wicklund, Windham has more than 30 significant waterbodies that provide immeasurable benefits including high property values, tourism funding, and recreation opportunities such as boating, kayaking, swimming, fishing, and ice skating.

"Sustainability can be viewed from many angles," Wicklund said. It may be protecting our numerous waterbodies for both environmental protection and economic growth or it may be reducing the municipality's energy use. It may be looking at the comprehensive plan, and land use planning."

Past actions taken by the Natural Resources Advisory Committee include coordinating a town-wide LED streetlight conversion, installing a 504-kilowatt solar array on the town's former landfill, and updating the town's Energy Plan.

The Natural Resources Advisory Committee was first established in Windham in 1997, with the purpose of serving as an advisory body to the Windham Town Council on issues related to the protection and enhancement of the community's natural resource base. It was amended in 2011 and again in 2017 but had had gone

dormant for some time until it was reintroduced in 2018.


The Natural Resources Advisory Committee is responsible for identifying problems, recommending solutions and proposing policy goals for consideration by the Town Council which will preserve, protect, and enhance the community's natural resources. In addition, they update councilors about the status of the community's natural resources, assist with the investigation of current and/or potential threats to the natural resources and help educate the public on short-term and long-term threats to the community's natural resources.

The committee meets on the third Wednesday of each month at 5:30 p.m. at the Windham Town Hall. <

Editor,

I recently watched the Jan. 14 Raymond Select Board meeting online and was struck by the ongoing disconnect of some of the board members from the residents of Raymond. Also apparent was the dismissive attitude toward a board member who was asking for consistency in procedures and transparency in the board's actions, and those residents who engaged in public comment.

Most notable of all was the board's

vote to approve the building committee handpicked by the Public Works Director, some not being residents of Raymond, and instructions to proceed with a needs assessment and engineering specification report for a new Public Works Garage. According to the Director of Public Works taxpayers paid \$70,000 last year for this report and can expect another \$50,000 to \$70,000 to be paid out this year for a new report. He also stated that the \$6 million amount asked for

in last year's bond measure for a new PW garage will likely increase to \$7 or \$8 million dollars this year.

As of yet there has not been substantive justification for an entirely new Public Works Garage. The director has stated he would like to have a wash bay and a large door mechanics bay in addition to the existing number of PW bays. The voters soundly defeated last year's \$6 million dollar bond measure for a brand-new PW garage by a margin of 525 to 221. If the Select Board truly represented the residents of Raymond, they would not present this measure again at a higher cost. It would make more sense to direct the Town Manager to go to the Public Works Director and ask for a pared down request.

To date, the Select Board, Town Manager and the Public Works Director have not even entertained the suggestion to look into the feasibility of adding two bays in a stand-alone facility which not only meets the director's needs but would be a much smaller bond measure that the voters

may be able to get behind.

It is imperative that residents stay informed and raise their voices. There are two planned public workshops coming up that will address this year's proposed town budget that will be voted on in June. This would be a good time to ask questions so you can understand what is on the ballot. This will allow you to make an informed decision on how you will vote on any ballot question. If you can, attend the Select Board and Committee meetings and engage in public comments and questions. Watch Committee and Select Board meetings online at your leisure and see your governing members at work. Call or email our Town Manager and Select Board and Committee members with your questions or comments.

Most importantly, use your votes once again in the upcoming elections to promote consistency and transparency in our town's governances and proper use of taxpayers' money for the betterment of the entire community.

The Windham/Gray-New Gloucester/Westbrook varsity Wolfpack wrestling team had a total of six prep wrestlers and four alternates qualify for the State Championships, which was held at the Lewiston Colisee on Saturday, Feb. 15. Windham seniors CK Kennedy, Ayden Cofone, freshman Tristen Merchant, Gray-New Gloucester senior Spencer Fields and Westbrook sophomores Jajjad Jumaah and Cole Tanner all qualified to compete in the event.

Cofone won his third state title in four years after he defeated Massabesic in the finals 15-0. The Wolfpack placed 14th overall.

"It always feels good, especially at a state tournament, to do what you want to do," said Cofone. "I knew I had it locked up, I put him on his back again and I thought to myself, 'that's it, I just got my third.' The ultimate goal is always a New England Championship title, but three state titles are cool. (A New England title) is what I'm striving for and what I'm going to keep working towards. I know what I'm capable of and I'm the best on the mat when I step on the mat. I go in with that mindset ... I thought I did good at top-game, always turning, always looking for another tilt, always getting more points because you rack up the points, you win easy."

As the winter indoor track season draws to a close, a select team from the Windham High boys' and girls' teams headed to the University of Southern Maine in Gorham on Monday, Feb. 17 to compete against schools from all over the state.

Out of 23 teams, Windham's girls finished sixth overall with a score of 33; while the boys finished eighth with a score of 26.

GIRLS - Senior Tayla Pelletier became a state champ and set a new school record of 8.46 seconds in the 55-meter hurdles. She also placed first in the triple jump with a distance of 36-8.5 feet; she finished third in the long jump with a 17-5.25 distance.

The girls 4x800-meter relay wasn't slotted to make the podium (top eight), but the team of senior Abigail Dumont, juniors Emma Fox, Demetria Nicholas and Sydney Broadbent earned a seventh-place finish with a time of 10:56.78 minutes.

They've been working since July; even working hard in the cold. It was rewarding to place seventh and a bonding experience. The three juniors gave it their all for Dumont.

Windham girls' indoor track and field coach Jeff Riddle said these girls perfectly fit the mission statement of this team. They exemplify who the Windham team wants to be.

"I just wanted to give it my all, that's usually how I go into meets," said Dumont. 

- * Land use restrictions to prevent exposure to site-related contaminants in groundwater and fish tissue until cleanup levels are met
- * Inspections and operation and maintenance
- * Monitoring of groundwater and fish tissue to evaluate the achievement of cleanup levels
- * Five-Year Reviews to assess the protectiveness of the remedy.

EPA estimates that the total cost of



this portion of the Keddy Mill cleanup project, including construction, operation and maintenance, and long-term monitoring, will be about \$17 million. The Superfund is the federal program that investigates and cleans up the most complex, uncontrolled, or abandoned hazardous waste sites in the country to protect people's health and the environment.

But finding necessary funding for the cleanup may prove to be a significant challenge. At least \$19 billion in Environmental Protection Agency funding to thousands of state and local governments and nonprofits remained on hold through last Friday and permanent budget reductions to environmental remediation programs may mean that the Keddy Mill Superfund cleanup work could be indefinitely on hold. <

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



you prior to calling the authorities to complain but often people do not feel comfortable or want to take on the risk of confrontation.

Another common complaint is about neighbors who routinely do not clean up after pet waste when walking their dogs. If you speak to your neighbors about your concerns remember that their pets are beloved family members of theirs.

Boundary disagreements are also

a common source of contention between abutters. If you see that your neighbor is planning to place or construct something like a fence or a shed in an area that you understand to be on your property it is best to approach them to further discuss this as soon as possible. You may very easily be able to clear up any confusion or come to an agreement that everyone feels good about or, at least know what to expect as next steps or when one of you plans

Using a little extra empathy and

compassion when considering how and when to best approach your neighbor about concerns or issues can truly go a long way for both of you. Keeping the lines of communication open should be the goal, so leaving a kind note is a great place to begin. 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
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
