Iconic Babbs Bridge reopens following crash repairs


One of the most iconic structures associated with Windham is back open again, six months after sustaining damage when an overloaded truck barreled through its floor crashing into the Presumpscot River below.

Repair work by the Maine Department of Transportation for the covered Babbs Bridge off Hurricane Road linking Windham and Gorham was completed Thursday, Feb. 20 and former State Rep. Gary Plummer of Windham was first to drive across the bridge when it reopened.

"Babbs Bridge is now open to traffic. Yes, I got to be the first vehicle to drive through the newly repaired bridge," Plummer posted on Facebook. "I am beyond elated."

At about 12:45 p.m. Aug. 23, 2024, police say a Ford F750 truck loaded with 36,000 pounds of crushed gravel attempted to cross Babbs Bridge from Gorham east into Windham on Hurricane Road. The truck's excessive weight caused planks on the wooden bridge floor to collapse and sent the truck crashing into the Presumpscot River below.

The posted weight limit for traveling across the Babbs Bridge span is 3 tons, or 6,000 pounds, and police said the truck weighed roughly six times the legal limit for crossing the bridge. The truck was owned by The Driveway Guys Company of Biddeford and was driven by Joshua Polewarzyk of Limington, 37, who was able to free

himself from the truck in the water and sustained minor injuries in the crash. He was cited for excessive truck weight in crossing the bridge and was fined \$2,500.

Maine Department of Transportation engineers were tasked with evaluating the structural status of the

bridge for public safety and come up with a plan for repairs and restoration of the structure.

MDOT crews began working to restore the bridge in January and the project cost \$110,000. Along with structural and floor repairs, MDOT

"The trails are in phenomenal

shape right now," he said. "The Pipeline is the biggest part of the trail system (in Raymond). And a lot of the trails stem from that."

Plummer chalks up the recent prime conditions to the perfect combination of ice-making on local lakes and ponds as well as some pretty hefty snowstorms.

"We are reliant on lakes being frozen and a good coating of snow afterwards," he said. Plummer explained that the trails cross several bodies of water such as Crescent Lake, Raymond Pond, and

Panther Pond, with the latter providing trail access into Windham.

Speaking of neighboring towns, the Rattlers pride themselves on great working relationships with snowmo-

Windham boys' basketball eliminates Edward Little in regional finals

After knocking out Portland in the semifinals 65-56, the Windham High School Eagles advanced for the third time in recent history to the regional final on Saturday, Feb. 22 at the Cross Insurance Arena in Portland. Second-place Windham took down fourth-place Edward Little, 55-49.

"It means a lot (to head back to the state championship) ... this is an awesome feeling," said Windham sophomore Colin Janvrin. "I'm super excited to get on that state championship floor and ball out again. We weren't really nervous because we've been here before and ... we were ready for this. I think (Edward Little) built up a lot of their team chemistry and they got a lot better throughout the whole season, so props to them. We just stayed through and fought through. AJ (Moody) played great defense on (Edward Little's Maiwen) Diing; he's a great player and AJ shut him down really well. Everybody on the offensive end just moving the ball around and finding whoever's hot - getting it done. I think we just got to move the ball around and find our good shots instead of forcing shots on offense. They were playing really good defense, and we got to work around it."

Edward Little jumped out in front early on. After Windham junior Tyrie James sank a three-pointer, the game got closer. Windham defense went hard after the Eddies.

Windham sophomore Colin Janvrin hit a three-pointer. The game remained tight; not all Windham shots fell. Eagle defense caused several turnovers. Moody had a three-point buzzer beater at the half and Windham led, 23-19.

"It was our best basketball that was needed to win, and, in these games, anything can happen," said Windham boys' basketball coach Chad Pulkkinen. "The guys did a great job holding their composure. I think our team is as united as it's been, which is important especially down the stretch when you miss some foul shots and adversity hits ... all kinds of bad things can happen, and I think our team was ready for those moments. We have great kids who have great experience, it just makes it easy for me as a coach. They were super hungry for it ... we

had to come out and match that energy that they wanted revenge; we wanted to make sure we were

Rules of the road

Growing up, I always wondered why my mother didn't want to drive.

My father drove us everywhere and he offered to teach her numerous times. For a while when I was about 10, she was enthusiastic about it. That is, until on a certain Friday night in 1964, she drove our family in my father's 1962 teal-colored Chevrolet Impala to the drive-through bank in Pittsford, New York where my father could cash his paycheck.

We had made that same trip many times since that bank had opened just a few years before. As my mother approached the side entrance, she turned on her left turn blinker, checked the oncoming traffic and started to pull into the bank's parking lot. But we suddenly came to an abrupt stop when she hit a newly installed concrete pole intended to divide traffic between entering and exiting turning lanes.

This was before the advent of seat belts so my brother and I who were sitting in the back seat tumbled forward when we hit the concrete pole. My father was in the front seat next to my mother and he immediately jumped out of the car to inspect the damage to the Impala.

The hood was crumpled and there was radiator fluid pooling underneath the car and running out into the street. The drive-through banking teller witnessed the accident and immediately called the police.

A policeman arrived and he helped my father push the car out of the bank parking lot entrance and into a parking spot. The officer spoke with my mother in a calm and reassuring manner and asked if she was injured. She was not.

My father asked the officer if he could drive my mother and us home. He stayed behind with the car and looked for a telephone to call his nephew Pete, who had his auto mechanic shop in a neighboring town.

Later that evening, Pete dropped my father off at our house. They had towed the Impala to his repair shop and the two of them had replaced the radiator. My father said Pete was going to work on the hood on Saturday so he could have the car back to drive to work on Monday morning.

In the meantime, my mother was a nervous wreck. She kept asking why the bank would install the concrete divider pole and not alert the public about it. She insisted that the accident wasn't her fault and that before she even had time to react, the concrete pole was there and even at a turning speed of 10 mph, she would not have been able to avoid colliding with it.

She talked briefly about suing the bank for placing the pole there and my father pointed out to her that it was indeed the bank's property, and that we were under no obligation to turn in there.

She cried a lot and said she was never going to drive again after that experi-

But my father would always ask when we got in the car to go anywhere if my mother wanted to drive that day. She always refused and said he knew why.

It became almost a running joke whenever we were turning in somewhere when driving to "look out for concrete poles." As my mother was really high strung and keenly sensitive to criticism, joking about the accident or her driving just served to make her even more steadfast in her refusal to get her driver's

In 1966, my father traded in the 1962 Chevrolet Impala for a 1966 Ford Galaxie 500 and my mother wouldn't even get into the new car unless she was assured that she wouldn't have to drive.

Years later she moved with my father to Florida and began work as a home health aide. She needed a car to get around and so at the age of 55, she practiced for a while and then tested and received her driver's license.

In 2001, when we were visiting our hometown in New York for a wedding, I let her drive the rental car and we drove through Pittsford and past the bank

I pointed out the exact location where in 1964 she had struck the concrete lane divider pole. At first, she didn't want to look, but I showed her that it was no longer there and had been removed.

She almost couldn't believe it and told me that the accident was the reason why she didn't want to drive for many years afterward.

As she got older, my mother tried to retire at 65 but never liked sitting around being idle. She took a position as a case manager for a social worker and would visit nursing homes to see patients.

She drove everywhere right up until being diagnosed with macular degeneration in both of her eyes at the age of 84 and forced to forego driving until she passed away at 95 in 2018.

A few years ago, my wife Nancy and I were on vacation in New York, and we drove past that bank parking lot. I mentioned the accident and Nancy said, "you're not going to talk about that again, are you?" < ~ Ed Pierce

Windham High students preparing for One Act Festival

Windham High School students are preparing to participate in the One Act Festival, an annual event designed to showcase one-act plays and theater productions that typically run 20 to 40 minutes.

This year Windham will be staging "Making Nice" by Alan Haehnel at the festival. This show is about a play within a play about a dress rehearsal that goes wrong when Occupational Safety and Health Administration (OSHA) members arrive. OSHA members mandate that no one can leave the theater until the production is rounded into shape and forcing the cast and crew to comply.

The Maine Principals' Association and Maine Drama Council host the One Act Festival every year and bring in new judges and students to be involved. Under One Act rules, each school's One Act skit cannot exceed a 40-minute performance time without facing penalties.

Students compete in categories based upon student population. The Class A competition is for schools with more than 500 students with Class B competition for schools below 500 students. Participating schools create

their own sets that must be reviewed and approved by the regional tech director first.

"The students and I discussed the pros and cons of the show at a meeting back in December and decided it would be a good fit for us this year to bring to the competition," said director.

"I am most excited about meeting new people at the festival and traveling," Biggs said. "Last year we hosted at WHS, and it was great but leaving for the festival gives a good new point of view."

She said that no matter if it's in leading or smaller roles, drama and the theater can have a positive impact on students, and a way to discover new areas of interest and develop re-

"The One Act has had a positive impact on me as it is a way for me to express myself in a way that the school musical doesn't let me," Biggs said. "The school musical is there for those who can sing and dance as well as act, but the One Acts gives students like myself a way to show off their acting skills and not get overlooked because they can't do it all."

In order to be eligible for the festival, all student participants must be in grades 9 to 12. The Windham High School group includes actors and stage crew members. <

bile clubs in the area.

"We work with the Windham Drifters Snowmobile Club who recently held their First Annual Poker Run," said Plummer. "We also collaborate with the Crooked River Snowmobile Club in Casco."

Windham to restrict public EV charging at town hall

Without objection from members of the Windham Town Council, the town manager's office will restrict public access to the three Electric Vehicle charging stations at the Windham Town Hall.

During Tuesday night's council meeting, Windham Town Manager Barry Tibbetts discussed posting signs and installing locks on the EV chargers after town employees could not charge their municipal EVs because the public was using them.

Tibbetts said that the town obtained grants in 2015 to install two charging stations at Windham Town Hall and added a third one several years later.

Through the years the town has been working to increase its fleet of municipal electric vehicles and decrease its dependence upon gas-powered vehicles, Tibbetts told the council.

He said that as more residents purchase EVs, finding places to charge them has led them to use the charging stations at Windham Town Hall.

"I thought it was important to bring this before the council," Tibbetts said. "When municipal vehicles are unable to be charged because all three stations are in use by the public, we need to do something. It's like in essence that they're getting a free tank of gas."

A high-speed charger typically can add 200 to 250 miles of range per hour to an electric-powered vehicle.

He proposed restricting use of the three EV charging stations at the town hall, posting signage that they are for municipal vehicle use only and securing them with locks.

Assistant Windham Town Manager Bob Burns said a review of the grants used to obtain the EV charging stations does not contain language that the town must make the chargers available to town residents.

"I think the EV system is being abused," Councilor David Nadeau told Tibbetts. "You're right to do something with this."

Other councilors raised the question about public access EV charging

stations in town

The chargers installed in North Windham at Hannaford in 2021 were funded through a grant from the National Electric Vehicle Infrastructure (NEVI) Formula Program. It provided states with funding to strengthen and improve the reliability of America's electric vehicle charging network.


Using only grant funds derived from the settlement of a federal lawsuit against Volkswagen, Efficiency Maine led the development and installation of high-speed EV chargers (also called "Level 3" chargers or "DC fast chargers") at a number of locations in the state including those at the North Windham Hannaford in December 2021.

Last year, the State of Maine received a \$15 million federal grant from the U.S. Department of Transportation to 62 Level 3 fast charging ports and 520 Level 2 charger ports at more than 70 sites in 63 Maine cities and towns, including some future charging stations in Windham at Shaw's Plaza in North Windham.

Councilors did not object to Tibbetts' proposal to reserve the Town Hall EV Charging Stations for municipal vehicles only, so Tibbetts said signs and locks will be installed there by March indicating the new policy. <

Forum to discuss proposed Long-Term Care Insurance rate hikes

The Maine Bureau of Insurance will hold a Public Forum on Monday, March 3 to discuss proposed Genworth Long-Term Care Insurance Rate increases.

More than 3,000 Mainers are expected to be impacted by proposed increases ranging from 1.8 to 233 per-

Maine Superintendent of Insurance Bob Carey has announced that the Bureau of Insurance will hold a public forum at 10 a.m. Monday, March 3 to discuss proposed rate increases sought by Genworth Life Insurance Company.

The forum is intended to provide affected Genworth policyholders with information on the long-term care insurance market, the rate approval process, and the reasons Genworth is seeking these increases.

Those who wish to attend the forum virtually or in person must preregister through a form on the Bureau's website at www.maine.gov/ pfr/insurance/news-public-notices/ public-event-notices or scan the code on this page.

Participants may offer comments and ask questions about the proposed increases. Representatives from both Genworth and the Maine Bureau of

Insurance will provide information and answer questions about the rate review process. Written comments as well as questions about registration should be directed to insurance.pfr@ maine.gov.

The proposed rate increases range from 1.8 to 233 percent and affect 3,057 Maine policyholders across or virtually scan ed. seven blocks of long-term here to register. care insurance. The largest

block has 1,274 Maine policyholders and has a proposed increase of 233

Genworth's filings have been under review since early November 2024. Following the forum, the Bureau will complete its review and determine whether and how much of an increase is actuarially justified. In addition to Genworth's rate filing request, the Bureau will consider policyholders comments made at the forum and submitted in writing. If a rate increase is approved by the Bureau, policyholders will receive

> another notice from the company explaining the increase and any options available to policyholders to mitigate the increase.

Companies must give 90-days notice before the increase takes effect and may specify a timeframe in which reduced benefit options need to be select-March 3 in person

> "The Bureau will only approve rate increases

that are actuarially justified," said Carey. We strive to maintain a competitive insurance market with solvent insurers that can pay claims, while also making sure premiums are affordable. At times it can be a difficult balancing act."

"Though some of these proposed rate increases are quite high, the Bureau generally requires insurers to provide policyholders with benefit change options, which may lessen the amount of the premium increase. Policyholders should keep in mind that they will receive an additional notice from the insurer with specific information about the approved rate change as well as the date it takes effect," Carey added.

But Edward Little was catching up. Windham senior Joseph Blige picked up a turnover and passed to Janvrin who sank a three-pointer.

As the clock ticked away, the game remained tight in the fourth quarter. Six points separated the teams with 2:38 left. With 34 seconds left, three points separated the teams. Janvrin hit two crucial foul shots to expand the WHS lead.

Windham then held down the Eddies until the final buzzer to win their second regional championship.

"It means a lot (to be going to another state championship)," said Moody. "Battling through adversity ... knowing what it takes and executing at practice. I'm proud of us all, I love all my brothers, our community loves us. After a bucket, after a steal, after a rebound, after a timeout, they're there cheering ... you have our whole community roaring when a three-pointer goes up - they're there to support us. What we executed in practice (led to this win); practice is our main focus all the time. I'm proud of these guys - rebounding is a main factor, Diing what a great player he is ... I thought we executed pretty well. (Edward Little) came a long way - what a great team they've become. We just saw that, and we had to take another step, another level to beat this team; we did a great job at that. Boxing out, trying to rebound (went well). We just need to get back on defense ... transition defense, help-side defense, getting to our spots and after that we're golden." <

WHS soars in **Quiz** Bowl tournament in Plymouth

For many Quiz Bowl participants,

the most exciting part of every tournament is the first round as it faces the rest of the competition.

"Windham was facing one of the best teams in the tournament, Plymouth," Ziegler said. "Windham jumped out to a big lead early, as Mason Bragdon was playing really well, and Plymouth's best player Reagan was having a hard time getting going. However, a couple mistakes by Windham let Plymouth back into the game, and Reagan took advantage. She went on a tear to put Plymouth in the lead going into the last question. Mason again stepped up, nailing the final question to tie the game."

This gave Windham a chance to win if they scored any one of three bonus questions.

The team missed the first two bonus questions and tensions were high,

but Windham scored on the last bonus question to win and advance.

Students prepare for the quiz bowl tournaments by setting time aside to practice twice a week, Ziegler said.

Every Monday after school the team gathers to work on potential questions and to practice for upcoming Quiz Bowl events. On Thursdays they meet and practice for appearance on the television's "High School Quiz Show."


"As a quiz team, we attend two different types of tournaments. One is Quiz Show, a televised program that you can watch, High School Quiz Show Maine, on YouTube, with simple, often pop-culture based questions," said Delia Tomkus, the captain of the WHS Quiz Team.

"Quiz Bowl, however, is significantly more academic. Quiz Bowl questions are often longer and more detailed than those on Quiz Show, and they cover a wide variety of topics including, but not limited to, literature, science, pop culture and his-

During practices the students share a number of resources as Ziegler works to create many Gimkits and other fun games dealing with specific knowledge that often will come up in Quiz Bowl events.



Windham Primary School Behavior Specialist thrives on solving problems

It's no secret that poor behavior in a classroom can result in lost learning time for children. Windham Primary School is fortunate to have someone on staff to tackle this quickly so that WPS is able to provide high quality teaching to all students.

Laura Record is Windham Primary School's Behavior Specialist and RTI Coordinator and has been serving in the role for three years.

Among her duties at the school, Record works with the Student Support team at WPS comprised of social workers, assistant principal, and a behavior interventionist. She provides social-emotional-behavioral support and interventions to children in and out of the classroom; provides a calm place for students to regulate as needed; and provides in-the moment support for students with behavior needs.

She analyzes student behavioral data; teaches various whole class lessons as requested by teachers; provides teacher coaching; is part of the school's attendance team; coordinates the WPS "Bus of the Month" program; is a 504 case manager; an IEP case manager; supervises and oversees the Noon Monitors for lunch and recess staff and assists with recess and lunch behaviors; is a Safety Care Trainer; and a member of the WPS Response team.

As RTI (Response to Intervention) Coordinator, Record schedules meetings, is a RTI team member, and manages RTI plans for students.

Record has worked at Windham Primary School since August 2012, serving first as a Kindergarten teacher from 2012 to 2022 when havior Specialist.

"It's great to see children making progress," she said. "What may seem as a small step forward to us, usually takes a lot of work and effort from a child."

That's also the most challenging aspect of her work.

"Often my schedule goes out the window when a student is struggling and needs support," Record said. "The biggest misconception people may have about my work is that I only deal with behaviors. I tell children that I'm the 'problem solving' teacher. If they have or had a problem, we can work together to figure out how to solve it or make it right."

replaced the deck and the bridge's ornamental doors. Work was performed ahead of schedule as favorable weather conditions for repairs including specially milled lumber from Gorham matching the existing bridge dimensions were available much sooner than expected for repairs to commence.

A previous wooden covered bridge at the site stood for more than 100 years having reportedly been built by local farmers around 1840. The bridge is said to have been originally named for a family living on property nearby and before its destruction was said to be the oldest covered bridge in Maine.

The original Babbs Bridge was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in America but was burned by unidentified arsonists in 1973. Using donated lumber milled exclusively in Gorham and with work performed by community volunteers, the bridge span was rebuilt as an exact replica of the original Babbs Bridge and reopened to the public in conjunction with America's Bicentennial celebration in 1976.

It is a single-span queenspost-style truss bridge, with a total structure length of 79 feet and a width of 13 feet, 9 inches. The bridge end portals have a posted height limit of 10 feet and the bridge is covered by a gabled roof, with its side and end walls finished in vertical board siding.

Vandals cut a hole in the bridge's roof in 2014 which was subsequently repaired but damages that were caused by a snowplow truck in 2015 required the bridge to be closed again temporarily. In 2016, MDOT authorized a near-total \$160,000 makeover of Babbs Bridge based upon its original design.

Work performed at that time in-

cluded the installation of cement stone blocks for the bridge abutment. Other renovations in 2016 featured stripping off the bridge's roof and replacing it with rough cut boards and plywood before topping it with cedar shingles. Work was also completed on the bridge's sides and entrances at that time. In 2021, the Windham Town Council announced that the National Register of Historic Places had removed its designation for Babb's Bridge because it is now a replica of the original historic structure.

The historic crossing typically carries more than 360 vehicles per day over the river. During the summer months, the property surrounding the bridge is popular with swimmers and picnickers.

The driver who crashed through the bridge last summer is no longer employed by The Driveway Guys company. Its owner has apologized for the incident and pledged to assist in community efforts to repair or replace the bridge.

For safety purposes, Babbs Bridge is inspected by MDOT at least every two years and the last inspection of the bridge for safety took place in July 2024.

Nangle: Pass the Supplemental Budget to protect Maine families

Every two years, the Legislature passes a biennial budget, a long-term spending plan for Maine. But, just like balancing a checkbook, ad-

Sen. Tim Nangle justments are often needed. The supplemental budget is how we make those adjustments, allowing us to address emergency needs, funding gaps and changing economic conditions. Whether it's rising healthcare costs, shifts in federal funding, or critical investments left unmet in the biennium, the supplemental budget ensures Maine remains on stable and predictable financial footing.

That's exactly where we are today. Maine faces a \$118 million Maine-Care shortfall, which threatens health care access for many residents. Half of Maine children and one in three adult Mainers — including seniors and working families — depend on MaineCare. Without funding, hospitals and providers may be forced to cut services and staff, leaving vulnerable people without care.

The shortfall stems from rising health care costs and increased usage of services post-pandemic. If we do not act, Maine's families, seniors, and rural communities will pay the price.

The supplemental budget also provides funding for critical spruce budworm remediation. This destructive pest threatens our forests and, in turn, the livelihoods of thousands of Maine workers. Without intervention, the economic impact could exceed \$794 million, crushing Maine's forest products industry, small businesses and rural economies.

The Legislature took an initial vote on this budget, and some representatives from our area chose not to support it. Their inaction threatens health care access, nursing homes, and hospitals and leaves our rural economy vulnerable.

This is not about politics — it's about keeping Maine families healthy and our economy stable. This funding must be approved by a two-thirds vote to take effect immediately. Otherwise, Maine people will pay the price while we wait months for relief.

Democrats have compromised. We have negotiated in good faith. However, my colleagues on the other side of the aisle keep shifting the goalposts, making unworkable demands. Continued delays of these necessary budget adjustments will hurt the most vulnerable Mainers.

We cannot move forward alone. Contact your legislators and tell them why passing this budget is crucial to your family and families across Maine. We cannot afford further delays.

It was Senior Night and Windham's Ben Shaw, Erik DuPont, Sam Foley, Philip Traina, Shaun Traina, Cole Heanssler and Bonny Eagle's Massimo Massaro and Shep Howard were recognized for their time and dedication to the sport of hockey throughout their high school careers.

"We've come off kind of a winning streak," said Heanssler. "We started to get comfortable expecting wins instead of working for them, so we came out pretty slow and ended up going down and it was just a struggle to recover; we weren't able to generate any offensive plays. We all kind of worked our hardest, especially in the last few minutes of the third (period). I don't feel like we're the team that starts losing and gives up, I think we worked until the end there - it just didn't work the way we wanted to. I think our breakouts were doing pretty good, we were able to get it out of the zone pretty easily. We did have shots on net; I think we need to start working the puck a little more in the offensive zone, especially up to our defensemen. (We need) movement and getting more shots on net; we need it to be a team rotation of all five guys."

Trail Blazers came out strong with

a shot on goal in the first 45 seconds. They were working to be first to the puck. Saint Dominic Academy led 1-0 after one period.

In the second period, Trail Blazers worked hard to score. They were aggressive and battled. Saint Dominic Academy scored again, but the Trail Blazers weren't discouraged. They had solid puck movement and really pressured toward the end of the period.

"It's just not really what we're looking for," said DuPont. "We had a lot of guys sick; that's definitely part of it. There's not really a specific factor – we win as a team; we lose as a team. Definitely when we were working pucks low to high, that works well – we just got to get back to that, I guess. Better puck movement was working ... move our feet more, move pucks faster, get our heads up (needs work);

collectively get better chemistry together and get ready to work at that playoff level speed."

The Trail Blazer defense kept Saint Dominic Academy scoreless during the third period, and Trail Blazer offense were first to the puck and had several solid shots on goal, but didn't score.

"What went well was our goalie played really, really well," said Trail Blazer coach Bobby Fothergill. "We've asked a lot of him this year and he's delivered; he's worked really hard to get better and better before each game. We had glimpses of good offense zone time – I never ques-

tion their effort, their effort is always there, it was more just poor execution. When we did execute ... working pucks low to high, high to low, getting the d(efense) involved, we had 12 good minutes this whole game."

As Fothergill looks to the postseason, he said the team needs to play their game and play with intensity, passion and love of the game. He said he doesn't want his players to make things bigger than needed and to just play hockey.

The Trail Blazers will play Thornton Academy in the playoff quarterfinals at the Biddeford Ice Arena at 5:40 p.m. Saturday, March 1.


"True strength within a team is revealed through adversity –

WHS Students are proud of how this team represents them.



Her Mainely Girl Adventures: The curse of the Sunday buck

I have been hunting for 16 years now, and although I've gotten my Grand Slam, I still don't have a Big Buck Club patch. In fact, I've never harvested a deer

bigger than 8 points. As many hunters do, I dream about shooting a big buck, but I've yet to figure out the secret to being at the right place at the right time. I scout. I hunt the wind. I try to be scent-free. I use buck lure and calls and try to be as quiet as possible. And when that doesn't produce, I change it up by not using any call or lure at all. I hunt every morning and afternoon that my schedule allows, including sitting in the rain.

I watch deer all season but the last three years, deer seemed to disappear as soon as rifle season started. The rut season seemed almost non-existent, with a handful of does moving early mornings and evenings.

Last year, three smaller bucks sporadically showed up on my cameras. I really thought there were no big bucks where I was hunting. With no intention on shooting a little buck, I started calling the curled spikehorn, Loki, and the young buck with a tall-webbed antler, Crab Claw. I had not seen Big Guy, the ten-point buck that had been in area for the last three years, until September and then I didn't see him again all season. After seeing more big bucks than ever, tagged at the nearby store and posted on Facebook, I assumed Big Guy was one of them.

Prior to the season, I had moved stands. I moved cameras so that deer wouldn't try to avoid them. Then once the season started, I bow-hunted and

then rifle-hunted moving to different spots miles apart when I felt like I was over-hunting a spot. It didn't seem to matter. All I ever saw were a few does, and spikehorn bucks.

Then came the first Sunday sighting. My husband, John, was checking his beaver traps. On his way back he spotted a big buck just staring at him. All he could do was watch him walk away. No rifle as it was Sunday.

The second Sunday buck arrived right after a rainstorm. A big eight-pointer with no brow tines showed for one day, during prime morning shooting hours when I would be sitting in my stand had it not been Sunday. He was a monster, and it was the first and last time I saw him on my camera.

Two weeks later, a small buck showed up 6:40 a.m. - when I'd be sitting in my stand had it not been Sunday. It ate acorns for a good half hour. That same morning, a big wide ten-point buck had strolled right by my stand at 6:04 a.m., before legal shooting hours.

Rifle season ended with the next two weeks chasing

the dream of a big buck. Every time a buck showed up, I would be so excited that when the alarm went off at 4:30 a.m. it was like the first day of hunting season all over again.

The next Sunday a buck chasing a doe filled my camera, which was also the first real rut action I had seen all season. I continued to see deer on my camera, but now they were strictly night images.

My season ended with seeing eight doe, two spikehorns, and a tall eight-pointer that I saw from my four- wheeler while checking traps. And of course, the bucks came back

Homeowner's guide to spring home maintenance

OUTDOOR SPRING CLEANUP

• Roof & Exterior: Do a ground-level inspection of the roof and home exterior to check for signs of winter

weather damage. If you spot problem areas, you may need to schedule a professional inspection.

Look for:

- Loose or broken shingles
- Cracks or signs of wear on the
- Damaged wood around windows and doors
- Signs of animal/pest intrusions or nesting

Although a home exterior is designed to withstand exposure to the elements, periodic cleaning can improve the appearance and, in some cases, prolong the life of siding and other exterior details, according to the National Association of Home Builders.

- Lawn Mower: Before firing up your mower for the first time this spring, inspect the blade. If it needs sharpening, have a professional sharpen it. Set the blade height at 1.5 inches to 2 inches for the first cutting. (Cutting more than one-third of the leaf blade when mowing can "shock" the lawn and cause browning.) After the first cut, set the blade height to 3 inches, which can help promote grass color and root growth.
- **Gutters:** Carefully remove debris that can clog gutters. Water overflow from a clogged gutter can damage fascia boards and the foundation, as well as cause leaks across walls and ceilings.
- Deck: Hammer or tighten nails or screws that have popped from deck boards. Look for loose/cracked boards

and repair as needed. Wash wooden or composite decks with a cleaning solution designed for the material.

• Pool: Inspect valves, filters and equipment for signs of wear or damage, and change or clean as needed. Or schedule an opening date with a pool service.

INDOOR SPRING CLEANUP

- **Kitchen:** Even with the best range hood, grease can build up on the tops (and fronts) of kitchen cabinets. Feel around for stickiness and use a good degreaser on the surfaces.
- Freshen up the garbage disposal by grinding ice cubes (even better, lemon/vinegar ice cubes or rock salt and ice cubes), then flushing with hot water and baking soda.
- Vacuum dust buildup from refrigerator coils to restore its efficiency. Clean seals and change the water filter.
- Clean the range hood; clean filters (if you can, remove and run them through the dishwasher).
- Attic: Attics need a post-winter once-over to check insulation for dampness (replace any that's wet) and seal cracks and leaks. Look for mold, insects or animals that may have crept in. Assess the area around vents to ensure nothing is blocking vents before summer heat builds.
- Basement: Dampness loves a dark, underground space. Look for moisture and mold around the bottom



of the foundation and seal any cracks. Check for excess humidity (consider a dehumidifier if needed). Open vents. Look for evidence of insect tunneling in any wooden framing.

- **Heating & Cooling:** The heat has been running all winter and the air conditioner needs to be ready to go. Replace HVAC filters and check the drain pan to make sure it is draining and hoses are sound and connected. (Or schedule a biannual checkup/servicing.) If you use window air conditioners, it's time to install them.
- **Plumbing:** The most common type of water damage to homes isn't caused by hurricanes or floods. It's caused by the dishwasher, hot water heater and other appliances or plumbing. Spring is a good reminder to give toilets, sinks and connecting pipes and hoses a good once-over for signs of cracks, leaks or dampness. Replace anything that appears worn or loose.
- Check ceilings for telltale water stains and track leak.
- Fix drippy faucets and showerheads and replace worn toilet flappers.
- Electrical: Check all outlets and cords for frayed wires, loose outlet

covers or cracked plugs. Make sure extension cords and outlets aren't overloaded. Put surge protectors where needed to protect electronics.

• Appliances: Draining the hot water heater to remove sediment can help prolong its life. If you have a water pressure gauge, test the temperature/ pressure relief valve. Most plumbing codes state that the maximum water pressure in a home should be 80 PSI or less (ideally between 50 and 60 PSI).

With snow melting and spring rains starting, it's a good time to run the sump pump through its paces. Clean out any debris. Pour in water and make sure it starts. Check the outflow hose.

• Chimney: Even if you don't regularly use your fireplace, an annual chimney inspection can ensure the flue is clear and sound, according to the Chimney Safety Institute of America.

Slow Cooker Italian Wedding Soup

INGREDIENTS

4 large carrots, peeled and sliced 1 large diced sweet onion 4 cloves of fresh garlic, minced 2 tablespoons of olive oil 28-ounce package of frozen Italian meatballs (about 55 meatballs) 32 ounces of chicken stock

4 cups of water 3 cups baby spinach, chopped 1 bay leaf


